The families of James, Thomas and Benjamin Smith part 2

Annice Greenwood, the daughter of Hannah Smith née Greenwood, married William Pybus on 20th November 1877 at St. Peter's Church, Birstall. This was just a few weeks after her mother had died on 22nd September 1877 as noted in part 1.

Notice that no father was listed for Annice.

Their daughter Hannah Pybus was born on 15th May 1878 and then baptised back at St. Mary's Church, Luddenden on 23rd June 1878. But look who else was baptised that same day. This would appear to confirm that James Smith Greenwood was the son of Hannah Greenwood and John Smith, presumably named after his great grandfather.

When little Hanna Pybus died on 13th June 1879, she was buried in plot K1 at Lightcliffe with her grandmother Hannah Smith née Greenwood.



Her sister Jane Ellen Pybus was born on the 19th May 1880 and baptised at Holy Trinity, Low Moor on 27th June 1880 when the family abode was given as Salthorn and father William Pybus was again a stoker.

Meanwhile Thomas and Rachel Gomersall née Smith had a daughter Mary, born 28th May 1871 baptised on 27th August 1871 at St. Mary's Wyke, and then a son John, born 2nd June 1876 baptised in Bradford on 29th October 1876.

On 31st March 1873 Benjamin Smith (junior) married Elizabeth Ann Jagger at Shelf. He was recorded as being an 'Inn keeper' from Norwood Green. She was the twenty-five-year-old daughter of Jeremiah Jagger, a farmer of Ox Heys, Shelf.

There were three more Smith deaths before the next census. Seventy-four-year-old widow Mary Smith was buried with her husband Thomas on 9th January 1877 in plot KK*16. Then Benjamin Smith's widow Martha née North died on 16th November 1878 and was interred in plot MM*21 on 21st November 1878. Less than a year later their eldest son James Smith joined them. He was only 36 years old when he died on 9th October 1879. His was the last burial in MM*21 on 13th October 1879 as detailed on their ledger stone. This is another ledger stone that previously became covered over - perhaps when the old church was demolished - but has since been unearthed to reveal the full memorial inscription.



On 3rd April 1881 John Smith and his cousin Rachel Gomersall née Smith were in the households listed below. Neither of John's sisters, Nanny Smith and Jane Shaw née Smith nor her husband Joseph Shaw have been found although Jane Shaw at least was still alive.


Little Jane Ellen Pybus seems to have been missed off the census form, but she was most probably living with her parents and step grandfather at Salt Horn Inn. With the Gomersalls was Rachel's brother Benjamin Smith who was recorded as being married. His wife Elizabeth Ann Smithn née Jagger was with her widower father, Jeremiah Jagger, a brother and a sister at Ox Heys, Shelf. She died there on 25th September 1881 and was buried there along with other Jagger family members.

Not long after the census was taken John Smith died on 8th May 1881 as confirmed by his probate record.

The Will of John Smith late of "Salthorn" Low Moor North Brierley in the Parish of Bradford in the County of York Innkeeper and Butcher who died 8 May 1881 at the "Salthorn" was proved at Wakefield by William Pybus of Oakenshaw in the parish of Birstal in the said County Engine Driver and Dan Firth Malster and Farmer and John Harpen Warehouseman of Low Moor the Executors. Effects £413 5s

He was buried with his wife Hannah on 11th May 1881 in plot K1. The headstone's memorial inscription continues.





The long memorial inscription notes the deaths already recorded above and then three more Pybus deaths. Little Jane Ellen Pybus died aged just 22 months on 22nd May 1882 and was buried with her grandmother, sister and step grandfather on 24th March 1882.

And then there is the dedication to her two younger brothers Walter and Herbert Pybus who died serving in the Great War. Their story, which obviously overlaps with this one, is told in the article.

When Jane Shaw née Smith died aged 44 on 4th January 1885, she was interred with her parents on 8th January 1885 in plot KK*16 as detailed on the memorial inscription that prompted this article.

On 16th May 1891, a few weeks after the census, James Smith Greenwood married Elizabeth Ann Sharp as recorded above. Notice that his father's name was given as John Smith. James and Elizabeth had a number of children before the family moved to the USA in 1906. He died on 21st February 1933 in Warwick, Kent, Rhode Island.

Forty-four-year-old Benjamin Smith junior died on 5th June 1893. Like his Smith parents and grandparents, he too was buried in St. Matthew's churchyard but in a new plot, J25, owned by his niece Martha Clayton.

Rachel Gomersall died on 27th July 1904, she was buried at St. Mary's Wyke. Her eldest daughter Martha Clayton married a widower Joseph Holroyd Q3 1909. Then her youngest daughter Mary Gomersall married Edward Lewis on 17th November 1910 in Wyke. He was a 'Carting agent from South Wales; both were aged 38. But by 2nd April 1911 Mary Lewis was a widow. He was probably the 38-year-old Edward Lewis who died back in Pontypridd Q1 1911.

Newspaper reports detailed in the article about the Pybus soldiers indicate that William Pybus suffered an injury that rendered him an invalid. No records of this accident have been found.

Thirty-seven-year-old John Gomersall died on 25th June 1913. He was buried with his uncle Benjamin Smith (junior) in Lightcliffe plot J25 owned by his half-sister Martha Holroyd. His father Thomas Gomersall of Highfield Avenue, Hipperholme died on 4th January 1917. Thomas was buried with his wife Rachel née Smith in Wyke on 9th January 1917.

The next occupant of Lightcliffe plot J25 was Martha's husband, Joseph Holroyd. The burial register says he was aged 72 years, but the memorial inscription says 73 years – it happens! He died on 21st July 1925 and was interred on 24th July 1925. The memorial inscription on the ledger stone over plot J25 was not recorded when transcriptions were made by Arthur Blackburn in the late 1920s / early 1930s so perhaps it must have been added later.

The widowed half-sisters were living together in 1939 at Highfield Avenue.

Eighty-seven-year-old Martha Holroyd died on 5th April 1947. Over one hundred years after her great grandfather James Smith had been buried in Lightcliffe she too was interred there, the last occupant of plot J25. It was presumably sometime after her burial on 10th April 1947 that the memorial inscription was added perhaps organised by her half sister Mary Lewis. The detail on the ledger stone is particularly useful explaining the relationship between the four adults with three different surnames.

Widow Mary Lewis may have died in 1955. The death of an 84-year-old Mary Lewis is recorded Q2 1955 in the Calder district. This fits with her age and the district would be correct if she was still living in Highfield Avenue, Bailiffe Bridge but no corroborating evidence has been found.
