#### The Sherwood family of Hipperholme and Lightcliffe

There are only five Sherwood burials recorded in Lightcliffe churchyard. All five were related; three were born in Lightcliffe, one in Wokingham, Berkshire and one in Sweden!

Their story begins in Wokingham, Berkshire where the birth of a William White was registered Q3 1859. He was the son of Eliza White who was born in 1838, a daughter of William White and his wife Charlotte née Brant as shown on these census forms.

Their daughter Ellen Sherwood was born Q1 1868 and baptised on 31<sup>st</sup> May 1868 at St. Paul's Church, Wokingham. Her labourer father, Albert Sherwood, then died before the year was out in Q4 1868 aged just 28 years.

On the 1871 census 32-year-old Eliza Sherwood, a widowed mother with two young children was recorded as being a 'Laundress', a live-in servant with John Henry Stork (Curate of Colwick, M.A. of Cambridge) and family at the Rectory House, Colwick, Nottinghamshire. Her children were with their widowed grandmother. Their grandfather William White had died in October 1867 and was interred at St. Paul's, Wokingham on 3<sup>rd</sup> November 1867.

Before the year was out widow Eliza Sherwood married William Eatwell Q4 1871. Their eldest daughter Eliza Jane Eatwell was baptised in Wokingham on 22<sup>nd</sup> September 1872. But her brother Thomas Eatwell was baptised and then buried at St. John's Church, Coley on 8<sup>th</sup> November 1874 and 7<sup>th</sup> October 1874.

Labourer William Eatwell moved his family north sometime between 1872 and 1874. They lived at Gardeners' Square, Hipperholme and he appears to have become a quarry worker. The births of Mary Ann and Robert Eatwell were registered in the Halifax district, Q3 1876 and Q1 1880, as confirmed by the 1881 census.

For the first time Eliza's son William was recorded as William Sherwood; he too seems to be a quarry worker. A year later two local newspapers recorded an accident.

#### **HIPPERHOLME**

DISTRESSING ACCIDENT --- About half-past eleven o'clock on Thursday morning, as William Eatwell wagoner, in the employment of Messrs. Joseph Brook & Sons, stone merchants, Hipperholme, was driving a wagon, drawn by two horses, on the Halifax-road at Hipperholme, he suddenly fell down in a fit, and the hind wheel of the wagon, which was heavily laden with stones, passed over his face from the left ear downwards to his chin, which was broken to pieces. Dr. Charteris was called and immediately directed his removal to the Halifax Infirmary. The unfortunate man has been subject to fits for some time.

#### FATAL ACCIDENT AT HIPPERHOLME ---

William Eatwell, waggoner (43) who was injured by falling from his waggon shafts at Hipperholme on Thursday afternoon died on Sunday in the Halifax Infirmary. At the inquest held yesterday it was shown that the deceased had a fit which caused the accident, and that the wheels of the waggon caught the side of his face. The jury returned a verdict of "Accidental death".

[The two papers seem to use different spellings of wagon and waggoner!]


Forty-three-year-old William Eatwell died on Sunday 28<sup>th</sup> May 1882. He was buried in plot H59 of St. Matthew's churchyard in Lightcliffe on 31<sup>st</sup> May 1882. This plot, which is in or near one of our roped-off wild areas, has no headstone.

His stepson William Sherwood married Sarah Jane Empsall on 28<sup>th</sup> November 1885 in Halifax as the record below shows.

#### Back tracking for the Empsalls.

Sarah Jane was the third of four daughters of Samuel and Sarah Empsall of Bailiffe Bridge. All four daughters were baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe; Rebecca on 20<sup>th</sup> August 1857, Fanny on Christmas Day 1858, Sarah Jane on 2<sup>nd</sup> September 1860 and Martha Hannah on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1870 although she was born Q3 1864. For the first three baptisms Samuel was recorded as being a 'Singer' but then a 'Labourer'.



Samuel Empsall, a son of John Empsall and Susannah Staincliffe of Birkby Lane, Clifton, had at least seven siblings. Many members of this extended Empsall family including parents John and Susannah were buried in Lightcliffe churchyard. To avoid over complicating this article their story will be told later.

#### The Empsalls of Bailiffe Bridge

Samuel's first wife, the mother of his four daughters, was probably Sarah Ellis the daughter of James Ellis. This information comes from a transcribed record for the marriage record for Samuel Empsal [sic] which occurred on Christmas Day 1851 in Dewsbury. No attempt will be made to link this Ellis family with any other Ellis family in the churchyard.

With his widowed mother, Susannah Empsall & some unmarried Empsall siblings next door.

Sarah Empsall née Ellis died on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1870. On 10<sup>th</sup> June 1870 the burial and baptism parish records for St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe record the burial of Sarah in plot S29 and the baptism of her youngest daughter Martha Hannah Sherwood. Before the next census widower Samuel Empsall married Susannah Robinson on 26<sup>th</sup> December 1870 in Halifax as detailed below.

On 3<sup>rd</sup> April 1881 twenty-one-year-old Sarah Jane Empsall was a live-in cook for the Peel household on Bramley Lane. Her sister, Fanny, had a son Leonard Empsall, born 3<sup>rd</sup> August 1880. His 6<sup>th</sup> April 1884 St. Matthew's Church baptism record gives a clue as to who his father was.



Edwin Lee and Fanny Empsall eventually married in Q3 1883 a few months after her older sister Rebecca married Thomas Marsden on 10<sup>th</sup> February 1883 in Halifax. Both bridegrooms, Thomas Marsden and Edwin Lee, were baptised at Lightcliffe and their families have many links with St. Matthew's Church. Fortunately, Edwin Lee's family story has already been told in

Thomas Marsden's family story will have to wait as it will involve untangling some of the many Marsdens interred in the churchyard – there are over a hundred of them!

#### Returning to the Sherwoods

The Sherwood story will now overlap with some of the Empsalls as well as the Eatwells. Going back to William and Sarah Jane's marriage notice the witnesses, Sarah's Marsden brother in law and her youngest sister.

Edith, baptised on 21<sup>st</sup> August 1887, and Ernest Sherwood were born before the 1891 census although Ernest, born 20<sup>th</sup> January 1890, was baptised later. In 1887 the family lived at Hill Top and William was an 'Engine Tenter'. Cousin Albert (Edward) Sherwood was born on 13<sup>th</sup> February 1899, the son of Ellen Sherwood.

Elsie Sherwood was born on 12<sup>th</sup> April 1893 and baptised with her brother, Ernest, on 11<sup>th</sup> June 1893 at Lightcliffe. Later that year on 23<sup>rd</sup> September 1893 William Sherwood's half-sister Ellen (Nelly) Sherwood married Harry Martin at St. John's Church, Halifax. They baptised James Lawrence Martin and his (half) brother Albert Edward Martin – that is what the parish register says but it should be Sherwood - on 4<sup>th</sup> August 1895 at St. John's Coley. Harry Martin was a 'Warehouseman' and the family lived at Birdholme.

There were two family births within a few weeks of each other in 1895. May Sherwood was born on 26<sup>th</sup> June 1895 and Mabel Annie Eatwell the daughter of Eliza Jane Eatwell on 22<sup>nd</sup> July 1895. Little Mabel Annie of Birdholme, Northowram was baptised at Coley on 6<sup>th</sup> October 1895 just before she died on 17<sup>th</sup> October 1895. She was buried with her grandfather in plot H59, owned by her grandmother Eliza Eatwell, on 19<sup>th</sup> October 1895. May Sherwood was baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe on 9<sup>th</sup> August 1896.

Her brother Harry Sherwood, born 14<sup>th</sup> August 1897, was also baptised at Lightcliffe on 14<sup>th</sup> November 1897. He survived just six months, dying on 26<sup>th</sup> February 1898. Little Harry Sherwood was interred in plot S30 next to his Empsall grandmother on 28<sup>th</sup> February 1898.

There never was a headstone for this Sherwood plot highlighted next to the Empsall headstone.

More information including the long memorial inscription on the headstone in the picture on plot S29 will be given in the Empsall family's write up.



Mary Ann Eatwell married Thomas Clayton on 8th October 1898 in Halifax. Their son Jonas William Clayton was born on 22<sup>nd</sup> March 1899 and baptised at Coley on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1899 when his father was a 'Brass Finisher'. The various households of related family - but not the Empsalls - looked like this on 31st March 1901.

Their Booth grandparents lived in Ripley Street, Lightcliffe.

Her paternal grandmother Eliza Eatwell formerly Sherwood née White died on 13<sup>th</sup> March 1921. The 83-year-old was buried with her husband and granddaughter in plot H59 on 17<sup>th</sup> March 1921.



#### Interesting – very interesting!

The 1921 census, taken on 19<sup>th</sup> June, recorded an individual's age in years and months, birthplace and occupation but also the name and address of their employer where appropriate. Married men were to declare how many children - not necessarily living with them - they had under sixteen,. For children, census information noted whether both parents were still alive. If they were at school sometimes the name of the school they attended was recorded. Not surprisingly Robert and Willie Martin were at Lightcliffe National School.

Robert Eatwell worked for Halifax Corporation Transport Department. The occupation of Albert Edward Sherwood - now established as Harry Martin's stepson – has been transcribed as 'Tirer Labourer' but is that what it says? What is clear is that he worked at Brooks [sic] Brick Works as his step grandfather William Eatwell (and others) had done.



But it is the entry for Ernest Sherwood and then the one for a grandson Harry William Sherwood at the Travellers' Inn that is the most interesting and revealing. Harry William Sherwood aged 10 years and 8 months was born in Fredrikshald, Norway. Assuming Ernest Sherwood was the boy's father he was recorded as being married -- although his wife was not with him - and having three children under sixteen years.

Norwegian records reveal that Harry William, Ronald [aka Rangvald] Ernest and Birger Johnny Sherwood, born on 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1910, 1<sup>st</sup> October 1912 and 20<sup>th</sup> December 1919 respectively in Fredrikshald, Norway, were the children of Ernest Sherwood and his Swedish wife. Ernest Sherwood, the twenty -year-old son of William Sherwood, had married Johanna Mathilde Larsson on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1910 in Halden, Østfold, Norge (Norway). The marriage record states that Johanna was born in Sweden and a Swedish record gives her date of birth as 12<sup>th</sup> October 1879.

A Norwegian census taken just a few weeks later on 1<sup>st</sup> December 1910 fits this informatin. It even helpfully records that Ernest Sherwood was born on 20<sup>th</sup> January 1890 in 'Halifakes' presumably the Norwegian for Halifax!.

Ernest Sherwood was in Norway when the 1911 census was taken but why?

The residence place name Fredrikshald was the clue and the fact that Brookes Ltd. had a quarry there. It very much looks as if Ernest Sherwood was another member of this extended family who worked for the Lightcliffe quarry owning Brookes family; and for at least some of the time in Norway.

#### 10. SCANDINAVIAN QUARRIES

From about the year 1900 Brookes Ltd. owned quarries on both sided of the Idefjord, which now forms part of the southern boundary of Norway and Sweden. A/S Brookes' Granite Co. owned or leased 6,000 acres on the eastern (Norwegian) bank, centred on Ystehede, a village about four miles south of Fredrikshald (now Halden). On the opposite side, round Pilegarden, the Swedish A/B Brookes' Granite Co. controlled 8,000 acres of land.

The Idefjord is very sheltered, with a tidal range of only two feet. It freezes in winter and ships were then loaded off the ice, horses drawing sledges of stone out to them. There was little overburden to remove, and the quarries were right at the water's edge, with wharfs all along the waterfront. The crane roads at Ysteherde were two miles long. Pilegarden had a short length of narrow-gauge railway with V skips, apparently to serve a chippings dump.

The quarries produced fine grained blue granite quarried by hand using wedges which split very cleanly. It was used to make setts, kerb stones and large blocks for dock work or girder bedstones. The stone was exported all over the world. Some went to Aberdeen where Brookes had a yard for monumental work in Pittodrie Street.

The quarries appear to have closed in the 1930s.

Most probably Ernest and his eldest son were only visiting the UK at the time of the 1921 census with his wife and youngest sons perhaps back home in Norway. Was this why no occupation was listed for him, and no school given for his eldest son? A few years later Ernest and Johanna with their three boys were back in the UK.

But before then on 28<sup>th</sup> July 1922 his sister Elsie Sherwood had a little girl named Lilian Sherwood who was unofficially adopted.

This photograph of Lilian and her adopted mother was very kindly sent to me by Lilian's granddaughter, Heather Connolly, who initiated this research into the Sherwood family.

Lilian's surname was actually recorded as Sharwood and then updated to Crossley after she married Thomas Crossley Q3 1940 in the Calder district.



Sarah Jane Sherwood died on 23<sup>rd</sup> October 1926 aged 66 years. As the Halifax Evening Courier reports, she was buried on 26<sup>th</sup> October 1926 with her son and daughter next to her parents in plot S30 of St. Matthew's churchyard.

### FUNERAL OF MRS. W. SHERWOOD HIPPERHOLME

The funeral of Mrs. William Sherwood, Travellers' Inn, Hipperholme, who died on Saturday, took place yesterday at Lightcliffe Cemetery. The Rev. H.S. Taylor conducted a short service at the house and also officiated at the graveside. Mrs. Sherwood was a lifelong resident in the Hipperholme and Lightcliffe districts, where she was very highly respected. She was an active member of the local Women's Unionist Association, in which her valued services in the cause were much appreciated.

The chief mourners were:--Mr. William Sherwood (widower), Miss Elsie Sherwood (daughter), Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Booth (son in law and daughter), Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Sherwood (son and daughter in law), Miss M.A. Empsall (sister), Mr. and Mrs. Harry Martin (brother in law and sister), Mr R. and Miss E. Eatwell (brother and sister in law), Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Lee (nephew and niece), Mrs Wilfred Owen and Miss Doris Marsden (nieces), Mrs. J. Bradley and Mr. Arthur Broomhead.

Representatives from the Hipperholme and Lightcliffe Unionist Association were also present.

Then less than a year later William Sherwood died on 27<sup>th</sup> March 1927. He was buried with his wife and children on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1927 in plot S30 of Lightcliffe churchyard.

## Hipperholme Landlord's Death

The death of Mr. William Sherwood, lessee of the Travellers' Inn, Hipperholme took place at his residence on Sunday. Formerly Mr. Sherwood was an engineers' fitter employed by Brookes Limited, Hipperholme, and was commissioned to go to their quarries in Norway, where he was engaged for about seven years. On his return to England 17 years ago he became landlord of the Travellers' Inn. He was a member of the Licensed Victuallers' Association, and for about five years served on the committee. As a bellringer he took part in the first peal of bells at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe, in 1881, and was well known in many of the local belfries. He was also a member of the handbell ringers connected with Lightcliffe Church for many years. At one time he was associated with Wyke Temperance Band, and later with the Halifax Volunteer

Band, in which he was an instrumentalist of no mean repute. Mr. Sherwood was a native of Hipperholme, well known and highly respected by a large circle of friends. The funeral took place on Wednesday afternoon at Lightcliffe Old Church Cemetery, when Rev. H.L. Taylor conducted a short service at the house, and also officiated at the church and graveside.

The chief mourners were: Miss Elsie Sherwood (daughter), Mr. and Mrs. Wilfred Booth (son in law and daughter), Mr. and Mrs. Ernest Sherwood (son and daughter in law), Mr. Hy Wm. Sherwood (grandson), Mr and Mrs Hy. Martin (brother-in-law and sister) Miss E. Eatwell, Miss Empsall, Mr. and Mrs. Leonard Lee, Miss Marsden

The obituary goes on to list Friends, members of the Local Bellringers, the Conservative Club and Halifax and District Licensed Victuallers' Association

The members of the Hipperholme and Lightcliffe Bowling Club acted as bearers.

The obituary confirms that William Sherwood worked for Brookes Ltd and that he (and presumably his family) went to Norway to Fredrikshald where he worked in the Scandinavian quarries for about seven years. This must have been sometime between the 31<sup>st</sup> March 1901 and 31<sup>st</sup> January 1911. During this time his son Ernest would have reached working age, so he too almost certainly worked in the Brookes Scandinavian quarries staying on when his parents and sisters returned to Hipperholme.

Ernest Sherwood is listed as the publican of the Travellers' Inn on Malcolm Bull's Calderdale Companion in 1927 presumably taking over from his father but handing over to another licensee in 1830. But Ernest and his family seemed to have stayed in the area in fact in the same street judging by the address on a marriage record and then that in the 1939 register.

His son Harry William Sherwood married Amelia Bishop Q2 1929 in the Halifax district. Their daughters, Frances M and Joan Sherwood, were born Q3 1929 (Hemsworth district) and Q2 1937 (Halifax district); the two closed records on the 1939 register.

Brother Ronald Ernest used his Norwegian name when he married Florence Mabel Ackroyd on 12<sup>th</sup> August 1933 as the Halifax parish record notes. Their son Brian was born on 21<sup>st</sup> December 1933.

From the bridegroom's address it would appear that he and his parents were living in Tanhouse Hill not far from the Travellers' Inn which by then had a new landlord. Ernest was a 'Motor man' but was he still working for Brookes Ltd?

His wife, Johanna Mathilde Sherwood, died on 7<sup>th</sup> January 1936 aged 56 years. Swedish born Johanna was buried in plot S41 in Lightcliffe churchyard on 9<sup>th</sup> January 1936.

As with the other Sherwood plot there is no headstone but its position, in the same row as her Sherwood in-laws plot, is indicated in the adjoining image.



Eliza Jane Eatwell died on 20<sup>th</sup> December 1934 and her brother Robert Eatwell on 15<sup>th</sup> September 1935. They were each buried in Lightcliffe churchyard with their parents in plot H59 on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1934 and 18<sup>th</sup> September 1935 respectively.

The 1939 register gives more information about the surviving members of the immediate Sherwood family. Before it was taken Eric Booth had married Ruth Scott Q3 1938 in the Calder district

It looks as if Ernest and his son (Birger) Johnny Sherwood as well as Albert Edward Sherwood may still have been working for Brookes Ltd.

Albert's mother Ellen (Nellie) Martin née Sherwood of 16 Towngate was buried at Coley on 16<sup>th</sup> December 1941.

Earlier that year in Q2 1941 Gladys Booth married William Joseph Beckett in the Halifax district and a daughter Jean M Beckett was born in the same district Q2 1946. Her cousin (Birger) Johnny Sherwood married Minnie Richards Q3 1945 in the Durham N.W. district but then their son John M Sherwood was born in the Halifax district Q2 1946.

Edith Booth née Sherwood died on 15<sup>th</sup> December 1947. She was buried in the middle section of St. Matthew's churchyard on 18<sup>th</sup> December 1947. Widower, Wilfred Booth, married Alice Crowther Q3 1954 in the Spen Valley district. He died on 12<sup>th</sup> April 1954 – the parish register says 13<sup>th</sup> April - and was buried with his first wife in plot A2 62 on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1954 with this headstone visible over the wall from Till Carr Lane.

Albert Edward Sherwood married a widow Ellen Augusta Shawmarsh née Dixon Q3 1953 in the Halifax district. The former Brookes employee died Q4 1978 aged 89.

Elsie Sherwood died in the Dewsbury district Q1 1958. Her brother Ernest died later the same year. Sixty-eight-year-old Ernest Sherwood does not appear to be buried in Lightcliffe churchyard with his Swedish born wife after he died Q2 1958, his death being registered in the Calder district.

The UK, Burial and Cremation Index, 1576-2014 has a West Yorkshire death for Henry William Sherwood on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1967 followed by cremation on 27<sup>th</sup> November 1967. Similarly for Birger Johnny Sherwood the corresponding dates are 14<sup>th</sup> March 1983 and then 18<sup>th</sup> March 1983. The death of Ronald Ernest Sherwood who was born 1<sup>st</sup> October 1912 was registered in the Halifax district Q3 1970. His probate record gives the exact death date.

Gladys Beckett née Booth, a granddaughter of William Sherwood, was buried in the new section of Lightcliffe churchyard with this headstone.



This Sherwood story started in the nineteenth century in Berkshire and closes in the twenty first century in Lightcliffe, but some members had made an interesting detour to Norway.
