
# The Taylor Sucksmiths

One of the missing memorials noted in

# Some missing memorials part 2

was apparently for a Taylor family but then some of them turned out to be Taylor Sucksmiths. Their story begins with the death of Jonas Taylor aged 28 years.

Jonas was almost certainly the illegitimate son of Jane Taylor. He was baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe on 26<sup>th</sup> February 1820.



It looks as if Jane Taylor was buried the same day her baby son was baptised. Although on Ancestry Rev. Robert Wilkinson's handwritten date has been transcribed as 24<sup>th</sup> February 1820 and her memorial inscription says she died on 27<sup>th</sup> February. Whatever, Jane Taylor was buried in Lightcliffe plot FF\*28 the first name on that Taylor ledger stone.

But who then looked after and brought up little Jonas Taylor? His Taylor grandparents, some of his aunts and uncles or even his father. We will never know.

Jane Taylor, the daughter of John and Rachel Taylor of Norwood Green, was baptised on 24<sup>th</sup> March 1793 at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe. Husbandman John Taylor of Hipperholme had married Rachel Blackburn on 19<sup>th</sup> February 1787. She was baptised at the Northowram Independent chapel on 29<sup>th</sup>November 1761, the daughter of Joseph Blackburn. These Taylors had several children baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe.

When Rachel and then John Taylor died, they were buried with Jane in plot FF\*28 on 29<sup>th</sup> September 1834 and 28<sup>th</sup> August 1839 respectively. The memorial inscription on the plot gives their death dates. This plot is close to the Till Carr Lane wall in the closed section of the churchyard. Is this where the missing memorial was situated? Who knows!

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Perhaps after his maternal grandparents died 19-year-old Jonas Taylor lived on his own. He was certainly on his own on census night, 6<sup>th</sup> June 1841. He was a 'Stuff Presser' living in Norwood Green not far from a Sucksmith family.



There were a number of Sucksmith – the family also used Shoesmith - farming families in Norwood Green at this time and even more in the wider area. Ancestry also transcribes the Sucksmith surname sometimes as Sacksmith or Lucksmith or Jucksmith and even Gacksmith. Many of these families have connections with Lightcliffe Church and churchyard. The WW1 Sucksmith soldiers have already been written about in

And an unmarried niece, Elizabeth Sucksmith, was housekeeper for her uncle William Hardcastle, who rented Roydlands Farm from Anne Lister of Shibden Hall. These wider Sucksmith connections may be explored later but this article will concentrate on one individual's direct line.

That individual is the 17-year-old Sarah Sucksmith on the 1841 census. She married Jonas Taylor on 7<sup>th</sup> September 1845 in Elland. Why were they married in Elland? Perhaps the earlier Lightcliffe baptism, on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1844, of John Taylor had something to do with the decision. The little boy was clearly baptised as John Taylor and not John Sucksmith. There are no birth registrations for a John Sucksmith, nor any of the surname variations, but plenty of possible John Taylor births registered in Halifax so pinpointing the correct one is difficult.



Notice that William Woodhead, a 'Presser' was recorded as the father of the groom. Did he figure in young Jonas's life and so was named on the marriage certificate?

A daughter Mary Jane Taylor was baptised on 12<sup>th</sup> April 1846 and then buried at Lightcliffe on 24<sup>th</sup> May 1846 when she was described as an infant from Norwood Green. The little girl's maternal grandfather John Sucksmith died on 11<sup>th</sup> November 1846 aged 56. He was buried in plot R\*5 in Lightcliffe churchyard on 15<sup>th</sup> November 1846. The Taylors had another son Fred who was baptised at St. Matthew's on 31<sup>st</sup> December 1848. This was after his 28-year-old father was buried there on 3<sup>rd</sup> May 1848.

And then Sarah suffered yet another loss when her youngest son, little Fred Taylor, died. He was buried with his father on 3<sup>rd</sup> October 1850 and so the missing memorial continued.

## Also of Fred son of the above said and Sara Taylor who departed this life September 29<sup>th</sup> 1850 aged 3 years and 2 months.

It looks as if widow Sarah returned with her surviving son John to live with her widowed mother, Rachel Sucksmith, and siblings at their Norwood Green farm. This is where they were on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1851. Notice that Sarah's son John was recorded as a Sucksmith.

And then on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1854 widow Sarah Taylor married John Shoesmith.

As you can see both fathers were recorded as Shoesmiths and not Sucksmiths. They had both been farmers, 'had been' because both were by then buried in the churchyard. James Sucksmith the husband of Frances (Fanny) Hardcastle was buried in plot O\*10 on 6th November 1822. It is tempting to think that these two fathers were related, if not brothers then possibly cousins or distant cousins, but this will not be explored in this write up.

This John Shoesmith/Sucksmith, the son of James and Fanny Sucksmith of Norwood Green was baptised at St. Matthew's on 9<sup>th</sup> September 1810. For both the 1841 and 1851 censuses he was farming with his widowed mother in Norwood Green. He and Sarah had a daughter Emily baptised at Lightcliffe on 1<sup>st</sup> April 1855. And then he disappears, at least no trace of him has been found as a Sucksmith or a Shoesmith after his daughter's baptism.

On both these census forms Sarah Sucksmith was recorded as being married but her husband was not in the same household. And notice that her son John – was he a Sucksmith or a Taylor? – was not with the family in 1871, the reason being that he had married. Does the name he gave on his marriage certificate help?

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John Taylor Sucksmith had married Grace Whitworth in Halifax on 26<sup>th</sup> November 1867, by which time he was a 'Stuff Presser' from Halifax. Notice that no father was recorded for him.

Fred Taylor Sucksmith was baptised at St. Matthew's Church on 21<sup>st</sup> June 1868. His little sister Lily Taylor Sucksmith was born on 12<sup>th</sup> November 1869 but died shortly afterwards on 26<sup>th</sup> November 1869. She was buried at Lightcliffe on 27<sup>th</sup> November 1869. A few months later on 3<sup>rd</sup> Mary 1870 she was joined by her brother Fred Taylor Sucksmith who died on 29<sup>th</sup> April 1870. Both names were recorded on the missing memorial which begins with Jonas Taylor, their grandfather – or was he?!

John and Grace Taylor Sucksmith were living with Grace's father Samuel Whitworth, a Beer Seller, on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1871 at 11 Gibbet St., Halifax. Their daughter Louisa was born a few weeks later on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1871. Just a few months after that on 25th August 1871 her mother died aged 27 years. She was buried in Lightcliffe churchyard in plot Q3 on 29<sup>th</sup> August 1871. Her daughter Louisa Alberta Taylor Sucksmith was baptised at St. Matthew's Church the next year on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1872. But who would look after this little girl?

Twenty-year-old Emily Sucksmith, daughter of Sarah and John, married 21-year-old Robert Ellis on 17<sup>th</sup> January 1874 in Halifax parish church. They were both from Hipperholme. He was a cordwainer, the son of a labourer Joseph Ellis. And then later that year her half-brother, the widower John Taylor Sucksmith married Ellen Newby Q3 1874.

It looks as if little Louise was brought up by her grandmother, Sarah, i her great grandmother's farm.

Ninety-one-year-old great grandmother, Rachel Sucksmith, died on 25<sup>th</sup> January 1883. She was buried with her husband John in plot R\*5 on 30<sup>th</sup> January 1883. Later that year on 19<sup>th</sup> September 1883 their spinster daughter Martha Sucksmith joined them, she was 72.

The Sucksmith households then looked like this on 5<sup>th</sup> April 1891 and 31<sup>st</sup> March 1901

The Ellises have not been found in 1891.

In 1901 the relationships between the three Sucksmiths at Hill End Farm, Norwood Green were incorrectly recorded on the census form. Edwin not Edward Sucksmith was Sarah's brother and Louise's great uncle. Notice that Sarah's daughter Emily and her husband were living next door.

Sarah Sucksmith who began life as a Sucksmith but then married Jonas Taylor before becoming a Sucksmith again when she married John Sucksmith, died on 18<sup>th</sup> August 1905. She was buried at Lightcliffe on 22<sup>nd</sup> August 1905 probably with Jonas Taylor in the closed section of the churchyard. Her name is the last one on the missing memorial which remembers Jonas, two of their infant children and then two of her grandchildren.

## THY WILL BE DONE, NOT MINE.

Her daughter Emily Ellis died on 17<sup>th</sup> September 1908 aged 53 years. She was buried in plot D21 of Lightcliffe churchyard on 19<sup>th</sup> September 1908. This plot is in the middle section of the churchyard but it has no headstone.

This left the Sucksmith and Ellis households looking like this on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1911.

Edwin Sucksmith of Hill End Farm, Norwood Green was buried with his parents and a sister on 9<sup>th</sup> December 1912 in plot R\*5. The ledger stone in the closed part of the churchyard also remembers a brother who died in Antwerp.

Also of MARTHA daughter of the above who died September  $15^{\text{th}}$  1883 in her  $73^{\text{rd}}$  year

ALSO OF WILIIAM SON OF THE ABOVE WHO DIED AT ANTWERP NOVEMBER 22<sup>ND</sup> 1865 AGED 48 YEARS

ALSO OF EDWIN SON OF THE ABOVE JOHN AND RACHEL SUCKSMITH WHO DIED DECEMBER 5<sup>TH</sup> 1912 IN HIS 92<sup>ND</sup> YEAR.

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Less than a year later John Taylor Sucksmith died on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 1913. The sixty-nineyear-old was buried with his first wife Grace in plot Q3 on 25<sup>th</sup> October 1913. He has a probate record, and his will was noted in local newspapers.

SUCKSMITH John Taylor of 26 Hampden-place Halifax died 22 October 1913 Probate London 13 November to Ellen Sucksmith widow and Louise Alberta Taylor Sucksmith spinster and Samuel Turner wool merchant. Effects £1657 2s 5d


His widow, Ellen Sucksmith, died on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1919 aged 70. She too was buried in plot Q3 of St. Matthew's churchyard on 14<sup>th</sup> June 1919.

For the 1921 census widower Robert E. Ellis was still a 'Boot and Shoemaker' living in Queens Road, Norwood Green. He died on 9<sup>th</sup> April 1932 aged 72. Two days later he was buried with his wife Emily in plot D21 at Lightcliffe but with no headstone or marker.

Louise Alberta Taylor Sucksmith has not been found in the 1921 census. For the 1939 register she was a 'Retired Invalid' with a paid housekeeper living at 26 Cromwell Terrace, Halifax. This was the address on her probate record.

SUCKSMITH Louise Alberta Taylor of 26 Cromwell Terrace Halifax spinster died 18 September 1945 at 166 Gibbet-street Halifax Probate Wakefield 31 December to James Arthur Saville engineer. Effects £825 12s 3d.

The seventy-four-year-old was buried with her parents and stepmother in plot Q3 but her name was not added to the headstone. Perhaps there were no family members left to organise this. But at least her final resting place is not a mystery as her paternal grandmother's is.
