# Elizabeth Sucksmith of Roydlands Farm

As already described in

# William Hardcastle of Roydlands Farm

Elizabeth Sucksmith was William Hardcastle's niece and housekeeper. She and her family lived at Roydlands Farm on the Shibden Hall estate which was rented from the Lister family.

After William Hardcastle died, on 28<sup>th</sup> October 1852, Elizabeth continued to live at Roydlands Farm with her sons James and William and her daughter Fanny. Another son John Sucksmith may also have resided there for a time, but he has not been positively identified after the 1851 census.

Her son William Sucksmith married Jane Brooke Q1 1856 in the Bradford district. They had daughters Suzanne Elizabeth and Clara baptised at St. Matthew's, Lightcliffe on 24<sup>th</sup> March 1857 and 16<sup>th</sup> October 1859 respectively.

These two Sucksmith households were next door to one another in 1861.

James Sucksmith married Elizabeth Bentley Q4 1861 in the Halifax district. They had a daughter Annie born Q1 1862 and then two sons John and William born Q3 1863 and Q3 1865; all three were baptised much later. Eleven-year-old Ann Sucksmith was baptised at St.John's Church, Halifax with her cousin Edith Bentley on 25<sup>th</sup> Mary 1873. Brothers John and William Sucksmith were baptised together at St.Matthew's, Lightcliffe on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1875.

Brother William and his wife Jane had Benjamin Brooke Sucksmith and then Ann Sucksmith baptised at St. Matthew's Lightcliffe on 17<sup>th</sup> May 1863 and 30<sup>th</sup> September 1866 respectively. But little Benjamin died on 23<sup>rd</sup> November 1864 aged 19 months. He was buried with his great great uncle William Hardcastle in plot F\*28 on 26<sup>th</sup> November 1864. The memorial inscription continued like this.

Again, William Sucksmith and his family were living next door to his mother and sister in Whitehall.

The *West Yorkshire, Select Land Tax* records for the years ending 1871, 1872 and 1873 are interesting. In 1871 and 1872 an Elizabeth Sucksmith appears to own a cottage in Hipperholme whilst James Shoesmith occupied a cottage and land in Whitehall owned by John Lister. Then in 1873 J. Smallwood occupied a cottage and land at Whitehall owned by John Lister and James Sucksmith owned cottages in Hipperholme. This was the same situation in the years before the next census with the additional information that it was Jonathan Smallwood who was renting Roydlands Farm.

Elizabeth Sucksmith of Roydlands Farm died on 27<sup>th</sup> May 1873. She was buried with her uncle and grandson in plot F\*28 on 29<sup>th</sup> Mary 1873.

Less than a year later on 4<sup>th</sup> February 1874, her only daughter Frances (Fanny) Sucksmith married Jonathan Smallwood. Four children were baptised at St. Matthew's before the next census; namely Elizabeth on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1875 when her cousins John and William Sucksmith were also baptised, Margaret on 4<sup>th</sup> June 1876, Annie on 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1878 and Thomas on 5<sup>th</sup> June 1881. For each baptism Jonathan Smallwood was a farmer of Whitehall, Hipperholme or Lightcliffe, almost certainly of Roydlands Farm, Whitehall which he was certainly renting from John Lister in 1877.

Fanny's brother William Sucksmith died on 15<sup>th</sup> February 1876 and was buried in plot C13 in Lightcliffe churchyard on 18<sup>th</sup> February 1876. His daughter Clara married Ezra Pearson Q3 1876. They lost their one-year-old daughter Agnes Pearson on 14<sup>th</sup> January 1880. A few months later her uncle James Sucksmith lost his first wife Elizabeth née Bentley on 19<sup>th</sup> October 1876. She was buried in plot C11 near her brother-in-law on 24<sup>th</sup> October 1876. James Sucksmith then married Esther Smith Q3 1879. Their sons James born 18<sup>th</sup> December 1879 and Harry born 6<sup>th</sup> March 1881 were baptised later, on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1883 in Barkisland.

John Sucksmith the eldest son of James and Elizabeth Sucksmith of Yew Trees Farm emigrated to Canada arriving in Quebec from Liverpool in August 1883. His family's story loops back to Lightcliffe so he will still be followed.

His half-sister Elizabeth was born on 2<sup>nd</sup> February 1885 and baptised at Lightcliffe on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1885. But by then she was fatherless. Her father, James Sucksmith of Yew Trees Farm, died on 4<sup>th</sup> April 1885. He was buried with his first wife Elizabeth in plot C11 on 7<sup>th</sup> April 1885.

The Will of James Sucksmith late of Yew Tree Farm Lightcliffe in the Township of Hipperholme-cum-Brighouse in the Parish of Halifax in the County of York Farmer who died 4 April 1885 at Yew Tree Farm was proved at Wakefield by Thomas Illingworth of Lightcliffe Stone Merchant and William King of Brighouse in the Parish of Halifax Grocer the Executors. Personal Estate £296

Later that year there were two family weddings. Annie Sucksmith married Donald Walker Q4 1885, and her brother William married Elizabeth Ann Pratt on 15<sup>th</sup> October 1885. Quarryman William Sucksmith and his wife Elizabeth Ann of Lydgate had four children before the next census; John on 24<sup>th</sup> November 1886, Janet on 24<sup>th</sup> March 1888, Aaron on 17<sup>th</sup> 1889 and Walter on 7<sup>th</sup> June 1890 although they were all later 'batch' baptised on 16<sup>th</sup> November 1901 at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe.

Meanwhile Jonathan and Frances Smallwood of Roydlands Farm had more children baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe; Mary born 15<sup>th</sup> July 1882 on 1<sup>st</sup> October 1882, James born 25<sup>th</sup> March 1885 on 10<sup>th</sup> June 1885, twins Edith and William on 25<sup>th</sup> July 1888 and John Stanley born 11<sup>th</sup> July 1890 on 28<sup>th</sup> September 1890. Little Edith was buried on 25<sup>th</sup> March 1889 at Lightcliffe aged thirteen months. She was later remembered on her parents' headstone on plot J12 along with one of her brothers.

Little Thomas Pearson who was baptised at Coley on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1881 died on 7<sup>th</sup> March 1882. His parents then had daughters Ethel born 21<sup>st</sup> February 1885 and Edith Annie baptised at Lightcliffe on 7<sup>th</sup> June 1885 and 21<sup>st</sup> August 1887.

Frances Smallwood née Sucksmith continued to live at Roydlands Farm, rented by her husband Jonathan Smallwood from Mr John Lister of Shibden Hall.

Then over in Canada, on 15<sup>th</sup> August 1891 John Sucksmith of England married Sarah Ellen Nettleton of England in the Donald District of British Columbia. Sarah Ellen Nettleton was the eldest daughter of the late William Nettleton, a grocer, and his widow, his second wife, Martha née Wood. Sarah Ellen did have an older half-sister Elizabeth Ann Nettleton whose story is told in the article.

## Private G. Percy S. Brown updated

On 5<sup>th</sup> April 1891, census night, Sarah Ellen Nettleton was a 27-year-old dressmaker living with her widowed mother, a grocer, and sisters at 1 & 2 Park View, Lightcliffe. Not long after the census was taken, she must have made the journey to Canada, but no ship's passenger record nor immigration record has been found for her.

Florence and Edward Leslie Sucksmith were born in British Columbia on 17<sup>th</sup> December 1892 and 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1894. But daughter Eleanor was born on 22<sup>nd</sup> December 1895 in Lightcliffe. The family must have returned to England, although again no passenger records have been found. There is a 1896 Lightcliffe Mixed Infants school record for 3-year-old Florence, daughter of John Sucksmith of Park View. Another daughter Norah Sucksmith was born on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1898 in the USA. Five-year-old son Edward Leslie Sucksmith died in the Grand Forks District of British Columbia on 15<sup>th</sup> May 1900. Another son named Edward, was born there on 8<sup>th</sup> April 1901 although he was recorded as William in 1901.

Meanwhile their cousins, more children of their uncle William Sucksmith and his wife Elizabeth Ann née Pratt, were born back in Lightcliffe; namely Hannah in Q4 1892, Jim in Q4 1894, Alice Q4 1896 but she died Q4 1896, Leonard Q2 1898 and then another Alice Q4 1899. Leonard and Alice were baptised on 6<sup>th</sup> October 1901 at St. Matthew's Church. No baptism record has been found for Hannah or Jim and there probably was not time to baptise the first Alice.

Ida Marion Walker was born on 12<sup>th</sup> November 1892. Her six-year-old brother Raymond Walker died on 6<sup>th</sup> May 1893. He was the first occupant of plot J11 when he was buried there three days later. Twins Roland and Arthur Walker were born on 8<sup>th</sup> June 1894. Ida Pearson was born Q3 1899 and baptised at Cleckheaton on 19<sup>th</sup> October 1899.

Her grandmother, William Sucksmith's widow Jane née Brooke died on 22<sup>nd</sup> November 1895 aged 68 years. She was buried with her husband in plot C13 on 25<sup>th</sup> November 1895. On 26<sup>th</sup> February 1896 they were joined by their eldest daughter Susannah Elizabeth who died on 23<sup>rd</sup> February 1896 aged 38 years. Daughter Ann Sucksmith married Fred Henry Weatherhead on 2<sup>nd</sup> June 1900 in Cleckheaton.

Esther Sucksmith née Smith the second wife of James Sucksmith of Yew Trees was buried with him and his first wife, Elizabeth, on 11<sup>th</sup> Jun 1898 in plot C11. Unlike his brother's nearby plot, C11 does have this headstone



Just over a year later there was this death announcement in the *Halifax Guardian* for 12<sup>th</sup> July 1902. Presumably John Sucksmith was buried in Canada.

SUCKSMITH-On June 11th, at Grand Forks, British Columbia, accidentally drowned, in his 39th year, John, eldest son of the late James Suckamith, late of Yew Tree Farm, Lightcliffe,

The day after this notice appeared Sarah Ellen Sucksmith gave birth to another son John Howard Sucksmith on 13<sup>th</sup> July 1902 in Canada. Then it looks as if Sarah Ellen and her children sailed on the *SS Lake Champlain* from Montreal to Liverpool arriving on 26<sup>th</sup> November 1902. The initials for Sarah Ellen are wrong and baby John Howard Sucksmith is not listed - perhaps he was too young – but the four older children are listed correctly in age order albeit with the William on the 1901 census form thereafter known as Edward.

The Halifax marriage record above is for James Sucksmith, son of James Sucksmith and his second wife Esther née Smith, who married Susannah Midgley on 28<sup>th</sup> October 1905. They had a daughter on 10<sup>th</sup> August 1906. She was named Esther presumably after her paternal grandmother.

The widow Sarah Ellen Sucksmith, having returned home with her children from Canada, was living with one daughter and a sister in Jessamine Terrace, Halifax. But where were the other Sucksmith children?

Eldest daughter Florence Sucksmith aged 18 was a 'General Servant' to a family living in Greetland. Her three youngest siblings were boarding in Halifax schools. Twelve-year-old Norah and 9-year-old Edward were at the Blue Coat School, Harrison Road, Halifax. Nineyear-old Edward was at the Crossley and Porter Orphan Home and School, Savile Park, Halifax.

And then the Great War started. At least five related young men all descendants of Elizabeth Sucksmith of Roydlands Farm lost their lives as a result of the conflict. Thankfully some others survived. Their family stories have already been told in

Siblings James, Harry and Elizabeth Sucksmith have not been found on the 1921 census. Harry may well have remained in Huddersfield where he married Sarah Elizabeth Heywood on 16<sup>th</sup> April 1927. He died in Huddersfield on 2<sup>nd</sup> August 1950. His brother James died long before then in Q1 1932 just before his daughter Esther married Jack Broadbent Q3 1932.

Clara Pearson née Sucksmith also died in 1932 on 27<sup>th</sup> November. She was buried in Lightcliffe plot C14 next to her parents William and Jane Sucksmith née Brooke on 30<sup>th</sup> November 1932. Neither plot has a headstone as the family plots C11 and C12 do.

Margaret S(mallwood) Spence née Wright was the Smallwoods' niece, the daughter of their older sister Elizabeth Smallwood who married Thomas Wright. It is Interesting that she and her daughters were at her mother's former home, Roydlands Farm on 29<sup>th</sup> September 1939.

Roydlands Farm had featured in a 1920 booklet *In & About our Old Homes* compiled by Arthur Comfort, an artist and wood engraver who taught art at Heath Grammar School. The sketch below – from Malcolm Bull's Calderdale Companion – is of the kitchen at Roydlands Farm.



The *Halifax Weekly Courier* which published Arthur Comfort's sketches added the following information about the old farm which had been in the Hardcastle then Sucksmith and finally Smallwood family for years.

ROYDLANDS FARM, Hipperholme, of which an interesting kitchen-interior is here shown, originally formed part of the Shibden Hall Estate, and was sold to the late Mr. Jonathan Smallwood about 30 years ago. The Smallwood family have occupied the house from generation to generation for nearly 200 years, and the present owners and occupiers are Mr. J. S. Smallwood and his sister, Mrs. Green. The antique oak furnishings, in excellent preservation, have been handed down the generations, and certain articles have occasionally been lent out for exhibition. A few years ago, a corner cupboard was sold to the Crossley family for 80 guineas and has since changed hands at a much higher figure. Two hundred years ago, the kitchen doubtless presented an aspect similar to that shown in Mr. Comfort's sketch today. Everything appears in harmony with the age of the building and with the old-time rafters of the low ceiling. The plate racks contain many fine examples of old ware, but of varying ages. On the right of the large dresser, an old warming pan is shown, another hangs on the left, but is not visible in the sketch The grandfather's clock, in remarkable condition, has a beautiful face, and is inscribed with the name "Thomas Lister, Luddenden".

Eighty-nine-year-old Ezra Pearson died on 20<sup>th</sup> April 1942. The former carpet weaver was buried with his wife Clara née Sucksmith in Lightcliffe plot C14 on 23<sup>rd</sup> April 1942.

Margaret Green née Smallwood died aged eighty on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1956 and was buried alongside her long-deceased husband, Henry Green, on 20<sup>th</sup> August 1956 in plot K12 of St Matthew's Churchyard.

John Eastwood was a nephew, the son of sister Annie Smallwood who had married James Eastwood on 11<sup>th</sup> September 1906.

Seventy-year-old John Stanley Smallwood passed away on 27<sup>th</sup> December 1960 and was buried in the Lightcliffe cemetery in the Smallwood family plot, J12, on 30<sup>th</sup> December 1960. The plot has this headstone but there was no room to add John Stanley Smallwood's name.



His brother Thomas Smallwood died eight years later but no burial nor cremation record has been found. The family's Lightcliffe plot was clearly full. There is a probate record.

SMALLWOOD Thomas of Roydlands Farm Wakefield Rd Hipperholme Halifax died 13 March 1968 Administration Wakefield 5 March. £713

Thomas was the last of Elizabeth Sucksmith's grandchildren to occupy Roydlands Farm. His death brought to an end the long line of Hardcastles and then Sucksmiths and finally Smallwoods who had rented the farm from the Listers of Shibden Hall. Eventually Elizabeth Sucksmith's son-in-law, Jonathan Smallwood, the farmer and cab proprietor, seems to have bought the farm as the sitting tenant. Sometime after the death of his son, Thomas Smallwood, the farmhouse must have been demolished.
