The Sucksmiths of Hill End Farm part 1

In the article about

The Taylor Sucksmiths

it was noted that Sarah Sucksmith, the fourth daughter and sixth child of John and Rachel Sucksmith first married Jonas Taylor in 1845 and then John Shoesmith/Sucksmith in 1854. The surnames Sucksmith and Shoesmith were interchangeable with an individual often using both at different times.

As you will see from the census records, Sarah returned to live with her widowed mother and siblings at Hill End Farm, Norwood Green.

Various members of this Sucksmith family were buried and/or remembered on this ledger stone above plot R*5 in St. Matthew's churchyard, Lightcliffe.

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John Sucksmith married Rachel Pinder on 9th September 1810 in Halifax. Working back from his death year, 1846, and age, 56 years, he may well be the John Shoesmith baptised on 26th September 1790 at St. Matthew's church Lightcliffe, the son of Martha Shoesmith

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If Martha Shoesmith was the mother of this John Sucksmith – and the naming of his first daughter adds weight to this theory – then she was probably the Martha Sucksmith who was buried in an unknown Lightcliffe plot on 16th September 1802. No other details were given on the parish record so nothing more has been deduced.

Similar calculations, using the death age, 91 years, and death date,25th January 1883, for Rachel Sucksmith née Pinder suggest that she was born around 1791. Therefore, the Wibsey baptism record on 29th May 1791 for a Rachel Pinder the daughter of William Pinder may be the correct one. Again, the naming of their first son William would fit but is not absolute proof. Neither is the fact that a 75-year-old William Pinder of Norwood Green was buried in Lightcliffe churchyard on 9th January 1836.

Following their 1810 marriage, John and Rachel Sucksmith had seven children baptised at St. Matthew's Church. The family lived in Norwood Green and their father was described as a weaver, then a coal miner and then latterly a labourer. The children were Martha baptised on 31st March 1811, Mary Ann baptised on 5th September 1813 but buried aged 27 weeks in an unknown Lightcliffe plot on 24th February 1814, William baptised on 2nd July 1815, another Mary Anne baptised on 10th May 1818, Edwin baptised on 25th February 1821, Sarah baptised on 7th December 1823 and finally Rachel baptised on 13th August 1826.

Mary Anne Sucksmith had a daughter Delia Ann Sucksmith - often shorten to Ann - baptised at Lightcliffe on 13th November 1836. On 6th June 1841 all the family were at home and John Sucksmith had become a farmer, perhaps at Hill End Farm, Norwood Green.

Sarah Sucksmith married Jonas Taylor on 7th September 1845 in Elland. Why were they married in Elland? Perhaps the earlier Lightcliffe baptism, on 7th April 1844, of John Taylor had something to do with the decision. The little boy was clearly baptised at St. Matthew's as John Taylor and not John Sucksmith. There are no birth registrations for a John Sucksmith, nor any of the surname variations, but plenty of possible John Taylor births registered in Halifax so pinpointing the correct one is difficult.

Jaylor

A daughter Mary Jane Taylor was baptised on 12th April 1846 and then buried at Lightcliffe on 24th May 1846 when she was described as an infant from Norwood Green.

Father John Sucksmith died on 11th November 1846 and was buried in the closed section of Lightcliffe churchyard on 15th November 1846 in the plot now given the code R*5.



Two years after losing her daughter and then her father a pregnant Sarah Taylor née Sucksmith lost her husband Jonas Taylor. The Lightcliffe parish records note his burial was on 3rd May 1848. Their son Fred Taylor was born later that year and baptised at St. Matthew's on 31st December 1848. But he too died aged just 3 years and 2 months. He was buried with his father on 3rd October 1850 and his name appears on one of our 'missing' ledger stones. Read more in

By 30th March 1851 widow Sarah Taylor had returned with her only surviving child, John, to live with her widowed mother and siblings in Norwood Green. Her older brother William Sucksmith was the only family member not at home.

There were three Sucksmith weddings before the next census. Daughter Rachel married Nathan Hanson on 6th March 1853. Then widow Sarah Taylor née Sucksmith - although once again the surname Shoesmith was used - married John Shoesmith on 18th March 1854 again at St. John's Church, Halifax.



Although the marriage record does not say it both fathers had died, and both were buried in Lightcliffe churchyard. The back story of farmer James Shoesmith/Sucksmith of Norwood Green will be explored separately, and an attempt will be made to find out whether the two fathers were related.

Then to confuse matters even further another sister Mary Anne married John Taylor on 22nd May 1854. Was the fatherless John Taylor related to sister Sarah's first husband? Who knows!

John Shoesmith and Sarah née Sucksmith formerly Taylor had a daughter Emily Sucksmith baptised at Lightcliffe on 1st April 1855 After that father John Sucksmith disappeared!



Nathan and Rachel Hanson of Wyke also baptised children at St. Matthew's Church; namely Willie on 12th April 1857 and then Sally on 9th January 1861. The same day that Sally was baptised her older brother 3-year-old Willey, having died three days before, was buried in plot HH*18 in Lightcliffe churchyard. This plot is the bottom one in the image on the left and but then the top one in the image on the right. The next but one plot is a Taylor plot.



Rachel Hanson's sister, thirty-nine-year-old Mary Anne Taylor née Sucksmith of Low Moor died on 11th August 1857. She was buried in the Taylor plot JJ*18 in St. Matthew's churchyard on 16th August 1857. As you can tell from the codes this plot was the next but one to that for her little nephew, Willey Hanson. Although we knew what the memorial inscriptions on these ledger stones said the actual ledger stones were buried under rubble after the old church was demolished. A few years ago, after a drone was flown during a particularly dry spell, the Hanson ledger stone was located and partly exposed for photographing. The Taylor ledger stone was buried even deeper and has only recently been unearthed. At the time the images above were again taken before the resulting hole was back filled for safety reasons.

Again, son William Sucksmith, who would have been about 45, was not at home.

Twenty-five-year-old Delia Ann Sucksmith Taylor - as she signed herself – married John Hodgson on 18th October 1862 in Bradford. Her father was recorded as being John Taylor, a stuff presser. In subsequent censuses he has been found living with the Hodgsons.

And then, according to the family's memorial inscription on R*5, the missing son William Sucksmith died in Antwerp on 22nd November 1863. No other records have been found for him after the 1841 census when he was a leather courier. Perhaps this occupation took him over to Europe.

John Taylor Sucksmith, son of Sarah and so grandson of Rachel, married Grace Whitworth in Halifax on 26th November 1867, by which time he was a 'Stuff Presser' from Halifax. Their son Fred Taylor Sucksmith was baptised at St. Matthew's Church on 21st June 1868. His little sister Lily Taylor Sucksmith was born on 12th November 1869 but died shortly afterwards on 26th November 1869. She was buried at Lightcliffe on 27th November 1869. A few months later on 3rd Mary 1870 she was joined by her brother Fred Taylor Sucksmith who died on 29th April 1870. Both names were recorded on the missing memorial which begins with Jonas Taylor, possibly their grandfather.

Sarah Sucksmith's son, John Taylor Sucksmith, and his wife Grace were living at 11 Gibbet St., Halifax with Grace's father Samuel Whitworth, a beer seller, on 2nd April 1871. Their daughter Louisa was born a few weeks later on 15th May 1871. Just a few months after that, on 25th August 1871, her mother Grace, died aged 27 years. She was buried in Lightcliffe churchyard in plot Q3 on 29th August 1871. Louisa Alberta Taylor Sucksmith was baptised at St. Matthew's Church on 5th May 1872, a year after her mother Grace died. It looks as if she was then brought up by her grandmother Sarah Sucksmith at Hill End Farm.

Twenty-year-old Emily Sucksmith, daughter of Sarah and John, married 21-year-old Robert Ellis on 17th January 1874 in Halifax parish church.

And then later that year her half-brother, the widower John Taylor Sucksmith married Ellen Newby Q3 1874. He appears on electoral registers living in Halifax and owning property there. The census data and then his probate record tell you exactly where in Halifax.
