The Sucksmith family of Underhill Farm

James Sucksmith and Frances (Fanny) Sucksmith née Hardcastle were definitely the parents of


Elizabeth Sucksmith of Roydlands Farm

because as Anne Lister of Shibden Hall noted in an April 1835 diary entry she was the niece of

William Hardcastle of Roydlands Farm

who was Frances Hardcastle's brother.

James Sucksmith and Frances Hardcastle married on 7th June 1802 in Halifax although as you can see he used the surname Shoesmith which was interchangeable with Sucksmith. Both were recorded as being of Hipperholme parish and James was said to be a husbandman. Interestingly an Elizabeth Shoesmith was married the same day- a coincidence or an important clue?!



After this marriage date there are four possible Lightcliffe baptisms for Sucksmith children with father called James; namely Ann on 10th July 1803, William on 18th May 1806, John on 11th October 1807 and Elizabeth on 13th March 1808. A memorial inscription confirms that little William who was born in 1806, died on 11th March 1807 and was buried two days later, was the son of James and Frances. And we know that Elizabeth was their daughter. But nothing more has been found about a daughter Ann.

From 1810 the Lightcliffe baptisms recorded the names of both parents. From the image below you can see that this John Suckmith was definitely their son.



And as no burial nor memorial inscription has been found for an infant John Sucksmith the conclusion is that the John Sucksmith baptised in 1807 must have been the son of another James Sucksmith of Norwood Green. Confusing, indeed!

Another James and John Sucksmith


There is a Lightcliffe burial for a 19-year-old John Sucksmith of Norwood Green on 22nd November 1826 which fits with the young man baptised in 1807. And just a few weeks earlier there was a burial on 2nd November 1826 of a 54-year-old James Sucksmith. It would seem quite possible that these two were father and son. Who knows! They will now be left and this article will concentrate on the family of James and Fanny Sucksmith.

Back to James and Frances Sucksmith

The Lightcliffe parish baptism register helpfully tells us that James and Fanny Sucksmith of Norwood Green had Mary baptised at St. Matthew's Church on 18th April 1813 and then Hannah on 29th September 1816, James on 13th December 1818 and Martha on 1st April 1821. On each occasion their father was recorded as being a farmer.

James Sucksmith died on 3rd November 1822 and was buried with his infant son in plot O*10 in the closed section of the churchyard. His wife, Fanny, may have been pregnant as a three-week-old baby Samuel Sucksmith, the son of James was buried in the churchyard on 14th March 1823. The memorial inscription on the Lightcliffe plot would appear to confirm that this was James and Fanny's son.

The naming of this son, Samuel, by widow Fanny may have been after one of her Hardcastle ancestors, a few generations back, or it may have been a tribute to her husband's family.

From his death age James Sucksmith/Shoesmith was born about 1779. A James Shoesmith son of Samuel Shoesmith was baptised on 9th September 1779 at Wibsey. But then an Elizabeth Sucksmith the daughter of Samuel Sucksmith was baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe on 13th July 1783. Were these the possible Shoesmith brother and sister who were married that same day in Halifax in 1802?

Eldest daughter Mary Sucksmith married Philemon Bancroft on 3rd March 1832 in Halifax. The Bancrofts were another Lightcliffe family whose story will be told in

Then her sister Hannah Sucksmith married John Broadley on 4th May 1835. Although she used the name Ann Shoesmith and not Hannah Sucksmith subsequent records suggest that this was the daughter of James and Frances Sucksmith. Her family's story has already been told in

On 6th June 1841 widow Fanny was at home, probably Under the Hill Farm, with three unmarried adult children.

Three-year-old Edward Sucksmith of Norwood Green died on 16th January 1862. He was buried in Lightcliffe churchyard on 19th January 1862 land remembered later on his parents' headstone over plot Q65

His grandmother Fanny Sucksmith née Hardcastle died on 14th November 1865. She was buried with her husband, who she had outlived by over forty years, and young sons in plot O*10 on 18th November 1865.

The only surviving Sucksmith son, James, died on 15th June 1869. He was buried at St. Matthew's on 19th June 1869 in plot Q65. His eldest daughter Fanny married Adam Hargreaves on 27th September 1870. Their daughter Hannah was baptised at St. Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe on 14th May 1871 when Adam was a colliery steward.

Her older sister Hannah Hargreaves died on 21st June 1975 aged just four years and 3 months. She was buried three days later in Lightcliffe plot Q66 next to her maternal grandfather, James Sucksmith, who she never knew. And then little Ada died on 21st October 1876 she too was buried in plot Q66 owned by her father on 24th October 1876.

Adam and Fanny Hargreaves brought their son Arthur back to Lightcliffe from Cleckheaton to be baptised there on 2nd April 1876. But another son Alfred born 24th December 1877 and daughter Clara born 20th January 1880 were baptised at Hartshead on 10th March 1878 and 14th March 1880 respectively.

Meanwhile their aunt, their mother's sister, Sarah Ann married farm servant William Booth, on 11th June 1873, she used the surname Shoesmith for herself and her father James. But her sister Mary signed her name as Mary Sucksmith.

William and Sarah Booth had five sons baptised at St.Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe before the next census; James on 4th January 1874, William on 7th March 1875, Jacob born 11th February 1877 on 1st April 1877, Edward born 11th March 1879 on 1st June 1879 and Fred born 17th January 1881 on 6th March 1881. For each baptism William was recorded as being a farmer at Norwood Green. This was probably at Under the Hill Farm, Norwood Green, working for his widowed mother-in-law, Hannah Sucksmith as confirmed by the 1881 census.

Mary Hannah Booth was baptised at St. Matthew's Church Lightcliffe on 6th August 1881. But the baptisms of Ada born Q4 1884 and twins Annie and Ernest born 11th February 1888 have not been found. Similarly no baptism record has been found for John Hargreaves born Q3 1883. But Emily Hargreaves, born Q1 1885, was baptised at Hartshead on 6th March 1887.



Fanny Hargreaves née Sucksmith died on 5th February 1892 aged 41 years. She was buried with her infant daughters in Lightcliffe plot Q66 on 9th February 1892. Before the next census her 23-year-old son Alfred Hargreaves would join them. The parish records state that he died on 11th February 1901 and was buried in Q66 – not L66 – on 13th February 1901. The memorial inscription gives a different death date.



Before the 1901 census William and Sarah Ann Booth completed their family of eleven children with Fanny Booth born 1st April 1892 and then Emily born 15th November 1900.



Twin Ernest Booth married Lottie Rogers Q4 1915 in the Halifax district. Lottie was the only child of Lewis Rogers, a carpet weaver, and Emma Rogers née Booth of Bailiffe Bridge who married on 25th October 1885 in St. John's Church, Halifax.



Lewis Rogers was originally from Crompton, Lancashire. He and Emma had their daughter Lottie, born 29th November 1885, baptised at St. Matthew's Church on 10th February 1886. This was where her mother had been baptised on 28th February 1859. Emma Booth was a daughter of Thomas and Harriet Booth. The parish record states that at the time this Booth family also lived in Norwood Green and her father, Thomas, was a 'Labourer'. By 1871 this Booth family had moved to Bailiffe Bridge.

Whether these Booths were in anyway related to Ernest Booth's family has not been explored; but it is perfectly possible. It is also quite possible that Emma Booth's parents were the 65-year-old Thomas Booth of Bailiffe Bridge and then the 79-year-old Harriet Booth of Field Top, Bailiffe Bridge who were buried in unknown Lightcliffe graves on 7th March 1885 and 18th October 1907 respectively.

Lewis Rogers did not live to see his only daughter marry. A year previously he had passed away on 10th February 1914. He was buried at Lightcliffe on 13th February 1914 aged 60 years in plot S10 which was then marked by this cross.

William Booth, son of William and Sarah Ann, died in October 1916. After a coroner's report – not found – he was buried at Wyke. At the time of the 1921 census his widow, Ellen, was living with an unmarried Hanson sister. The whereabouts of some of the rest of the family including who their employer was if they were employed was recorded on the 1921 census taken on 19th June 1921.
