# The Tomlinson and Mosey families

In the article about

# **Abraham Hemingway of Southolme Farm**

it was noted that his son George Hemingway was buried in Lightcliffe churchyard with his Tomlinson in laws. But before then an infant, Alice Ann Hemingway, George's daughter and so Abraham's granddaughter was buried with her great grandmother Frances Mosey. Then I realised that the chest tomb in the closed section of the churchyard with its side collapsing was dedicated to a Mosey couple and their son. [Don't worry even when there was a tomb above ground the occupants of the plot were buried as normal underground.]

Time to investigate these two families.



The Mosey couple were John Mosey and his wife Sarah née Carter. They were married in Halifax on 26<sup>th</sup> August 1764. Both bride and groom were 'of Hipperholme' and he was described as manufacturer.

The Lightcliffe parish records then have nine possible baptisms of Mosey children whose father's name was John or Jn'o. A son Francis, baptised on 16<sup>th</sup> December 1764, was definitely John and Sarah's first born as you will see from his memorial inscription later on. Jeremiah baptised on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1766, John on 18<sup>th</sup> September 1768, Mary on 31<sup>st</sup> March 1771, Sarah on 26<sup>th</sup> September 1773, Samuel on 3<sup>rd</sup> September 1775 and Elizabeth on 29<sup>th</sup> September 1779 were most probably Francis's siblings. Two little boys both named William were baptised at St.Matthew's Church. The first William on 4<sup>th</sup> March 1781 but then he was buried in the churchyard on 13<sup>th</sup> April 1783. A second William was baptised on 22<sup>nd</sup> May 1785 but he was buried on 27<sup>th</sup> April 1786, again in an unknown plot. The burial records describe the infants as being sons of John so they were almost certainly the two sons referred to in the memorial inscription on their parents tomb over the plot now given the code P\*11. The daughter may have been Sarah or Elizabeth or a little girl who was not baptised.

Fifty-two-year-old John Mosey died on 14<sup>th</sup> July 1791 with his wife passing away nearly three years later on 4<sup>th</sup> February 1794 aged fifty. They were buried in St. Matthew's churchyard on 17<sup>th</sup> July 1791 and 7<sup>th</sup> February 1794 respectively.

Eldest son Francis Mosey married Fanny, but the marriage date and Fanny's maiden name have not been found. They had two children baptised at St. Matthew's Church, George Daykin Mosey on 31<sup>st</sup> August 1800 and Mary on 6<sup>th</sup> March 1803. It was hoped that George's middle name was a clue to his mother or grandmother's maiden name, but it did not help.

George Daykin Mosey was almost certainly the Mosey who features in Anne Lister's diaries, as a joiner / carpenter and wheelwright. From 1826 Anne Lister has him 'railing off' places such as Calf Croft and Lower Brea Wood.

# On New Year's Day 1829 she wrote :-

went out at 9 3/4 to Mosey in the Cunnery brow among the fir timber cutting out 9 feet long posts (to stand 7 feet out of the ground) for fencing off single trees.

### From 1836

Mark Hepworth at H-x binding his son William apprentice as wheel-right and carpenter to Mosey of Halfhouses near Hove edge

Also in 1836 – but there are other references to carts being bought and sold from and to Mosey.

- after the Manns had Mosey and Mark Hepworth – paid the former for a good strong new broad wheeled cart £25 but he took 2 old carts at £5 so that I paid him only £20

[Mark Hepworth was another Shibden Hall tenant who will need to be researched as he too was buried in St. Matthew's churchyard, Lightcliffe]

It appears that George Mosey also did work for Ann Walker

From 1839

then came Mosey to be paid £33.11.5 for new tree-guards at Cliff hill -

Meanwhile his sister Mary Mosey had married Richard Tomlinson on 4<sup>th</sup> November 1832 in Halifax with their father Francis Mosey as a witness. Richard was probably the son of William and Hannah Tomlinson born on 2<sup>nd</sup> October 1809, baptised at St. Cuthbert's Church, Ackworth on 22<sup>nd</sup> October 1809.

Richard and Mary Tomlinson had a daughter Ann baptised at St. Matthew's, Lightcliffe on 5<sup>th</sup> May 1833 when Richard was a Lightcliffe farmer.

Halfhouse - or Halfhouses as Anne Lister referred to the place - was where George Mosey and his parents were on 6<sup>th</sup> June 1841 with his sister, brother-in-law and little niece, two households away on the census form.



But who was 15-year-old John Mosey?

There is a Lightcliffe baptism for a John Mosey on 4<sup>th</sup> May 1823 giving his parents as John and Mary Mosey of Hove Edge.




But when cartwright John Mosey of Hipperholme married Susannah Booth in Halifax on 5<sup>th</sup> April 1847 no father was recorded for him. This suggests that he was Mary Mosey's son living with his maternal grandparents and uncle in 1841. Perhaps he worked with his carpenter and wheelwright uncle George Mosey.


By 1847 Susannah Booth already had a son Thomas Booth baptised at Lightcliffe on 30<sup>th</sup> March 1845. She and John had more children, but they were not all baptised at St. Matthew's.

John 's maternal grandmother, Fanny Mosey of Hove Edge, died on 18<sup>th</sup> September 1847. She was buried in the front closed section of the churchyard on 21<sup>st</sup> September 1847 in the plot now given the code P\*8 which has this ledger stone over it.



A year later when her husband Francis Mosey died on 13<sup>th</sup> September 1848, he was buried with his parents in plot P\*11 on 15thSeptember 1848 with the memorial inscription already recorded on the now slightly collapsing chest tomb.

A few days later his grandson John Mosey, a wheelwright of Hove Edge, had a daughter Fanny – it does say Fanny not Henry – baptised at St. Matthew's.

These three households were recorded next to one another on the census form.

Six - year-old Thomas Booth was with his maternal grandparents William and Mary Booth.

Ann Tomlinson married George Hemingway on 9<sup>th</sup> January 1854 at the Square Chapel, Halifax. Then this notice appeared in the *Halifax Courier* on 27<sup>th</sup> October 1855.

NOTICE IS HERBY GIVEN, that by an Indenture, dated the Twentieth day of October, 1855, GEORGE MOSEY, of Hove Edge near Halifax, in the County of York, Wheelwright, ASSIGNED all his ESTATE and EFFECTS whatsoever to GEORGE HEMINGWAY, of Southowram, in the said County, Farmer, in trust for the equal Benefit of the Creditors of the said GEORGE MOSEY as should execute the said Indenture, or otherwise assent thereto, on or before the first day of December next.


When little Alice Ann Hemingway, the daughter of George and his wife Ann née Tomlinson died on 4<sup>th</sup> December 1865 she was buried with her great grandmother Fanny Mosey in Lightcliffe plot P\*8 on 8<sup>th</sup> December 1865. As the memorial inscription says she was just fifteen months old.



Mary Tomlinson died on 14<sup>th</sup> August 1867 and was buried in Lightcliffe plot T27 on 17<sup>th</sup> August 1867. Until recently all but the black stained part of this ledger stone was buried.



When widower Richard Tomlinson married widow Christiana Greenwood on 18<sup>th</sup> March 1868 in Birstall he was described as a 'Traveller'.



George Daykin Mosey has not been found on the 1871 census although he should be somewhere. Anne Lister's cart builder, fence maker and general carpenter, George Daykin Moisey, died a year later and was buried in an unknown plot in Lightcliffe churchyard on 25<sup>th</sup> Mary 1872.

His nephew John Mosey – another carpenter and wheelwright - and family were still living in Hove Edge on 2<sup>nd</sup> April 1871 but will no longer be followed as most of them have no further connections with St.Matthew's Church, Lightcliffe. However, three of the Mosey daughters - Mary, Anne and Emma - do so their stories will be told in :-

That just leaves Richard Tomlinson to check up on in 1871 and then 1881.

He was buried on 29<sup>th</sup> September 1881 with his first wife in plot T27 which would later be occupied by his only daughter and son-in-law Ann and George Hemingway. The recently unearthed ledger stone over this plot has the following memorial inscription on it.
